

Leader's Guide and Answer Key

Welcome to the study of *No Matter What*. If you are a small-group leader, you will want to acquaint yourself with the overall structure of the Bible study. Each member of your group should have her own book and should complete each lesson on her own before it is discussed in the group. Discussion is effective in helping your group members think through the personal applications of a lesson. Try to keep the discussion focused on the lesson, and encourage all members of the group to participate. As the leader, you need to do little more than ask the questions and allow class members to share their answers. The following answers are provided to help you give details that will allow group members to realize what God reveals about Himself in the Scriptures. To draw the discussion to a close, ask class members to summarize the conclusions that have been reached or to share something from the final application section, "Reflections."





Blessing Our Great God

- p. 1 Q: Have you ever had something like that happen to you? How did you feel when you realized someone was watching you, maybe even making fun of you?
 - A: Answers will vary.
- p. 2 Q: Psalm 104 begins and ends . . . with the same phrase. What is that phrase (verses 1 and 35)?
 - A: bless the Lord, O my soul
- p. 2 Q: The psalmist does not address himself by name, but rather speaks to which part of himself (verse 1)?
 - A: soul
- p. 2 Q: Look up Proverbs 4:23 and write it below.
 - A: "Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life."
- p. 3 Q: Do we know what this psalmist is going through in his personal life?
 - A: probably not
- p. 3 Q: Do we even know who this psalmist is?
 - A: probably not
- p. 4 Q: Read 1 Peter 1:13. Fill in the blanks:
 - A: "Wherefore <u>gird</u> <u>up</u> the loins of your <u>mind</u>" (1 Peter 1:13a).
- p. 4 Q: Can you think of some thought that might need *girding up* in your mind? (Helpful Hint: 2 Corinthians 10:5.)
 - A: Answers will vary. (arguments, lofty opinions, conceit, etc.)
- pp. 4–5 Q: Read Philippians 4:8. What things are you supposed to think on?
 - A: Things that are true, honest (honorable), just, pure, lovely, of good report (commendable)

- p. 5 Q: Back in Psalm 104:1, what does the psalmist tell his soul to do?
 - A: " Bless the Lord, O my soul."
- p. 5 Q: How does Psalm 103 begin?
 - A: Bless the Lord

pp. 5-6 Q: David goes on to tell us two practical ways that we can do that (Psalm 103:1-2). Fill in the blanks.

A:

- 1. In Psalm 103:1, it's a matter of blessing His holy <u>name</u> and *praising* God for Who He is.
- 2. In Psalm 103:2, it's a matter of *not* <u>forgetting</u> the blessings He gives to us, but rather remembering and *thanking* Him for what He does.

Blessing God For What He's Done

"Forgiveth all thine iniquities"—God's salvation provided for me by Jesus Christ's death on the cross for my sin!

"healeth all thy diseases"—God cares for my physical needs including disease or sickness.

"redeemeth thy life from destruction"—God protects me from things that would destroy me.

"crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies"—God lavishes His kind love and mercy on me.

"satisfieth thy mouth with good things"—God provides food and all of the sustenance that I need.

A: others who fear (reverence) God

4. Just in how you live:

Example: 1 Corinthians 10:31. When are we to glorify God (give others the right opinion of Him)?

A: when eating or drinking or in any activity

- p. 40 Q: Was David's thirsty soul (verse 1) satisfied in God (verse 5)?
 - A: Yes. It was satisfied to the fullest.

 - A: birds singing among the branches
- p. 40 Q: What have these birds made by the springs (Psalm 104:12)?
 - A: habitations (homes)
- p. 40 Q: Where have the sparrow and swallow in this verse made their homes?
 - A: in God's altars

- p. 41 Q: What do we find the birds in Psalm 104:12b doing?
 - A: making their homes next to the water and singing
- Q: Write out Psalm 147:1 here, and take just a minute to ask yourself if your heart agrees.
 - A: "Praise ye the Lord: for it is good to sing praises unto our God; for it is pleasant; and praise is comely."
- Q: Will you trust our great God to supply all of your needs—physical, emotional, social, and spiritual?


